#### Brigada Eskwela 2022: Tugon sa Hamon ng Ligtas na Balik-Aral

Every year, the Department of Education (DepEd) launches the Brigada Eskwela campaign whose primary goals are to uphold schools and encourage community cooperation. Two years after the COVID-19 pandemic, the department has stated that conventional face-to-face lessons between public and private schools have resumed. This presents a complicated issue in maintaining student and faculty safety at school facilities and in classrooms.

Taking that into consideration, the faculty members and students from the College of Arts and Science (CAS) worked together to raise funds for the partner schools of Mapúa Malayan Colleges Laguna (Mapúa MCL) for Brigada Eskwela 2022. This initative aligns with the United Nations' (UN) Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 4: Quality Education and 9: Industry, Innovation, and Infrastructure.

In less than a month, Prof. Christine Joanne L. Descado and her students have collected a total of P15,645 which they used to purchase gallons of alcohol, disinfectants, soap, and protective masks as integral parts of the hygiene and sanitation kits. These donations were entrusted to CSCE and were then turned over on September 21 and 22, 2022, to the partner schools in Laguna, namely: Banay-Banay Elementary School in Cabuyao, Calauan Central Elementary School, Don Jose Integrated High School in Santa Rosa City, Latian Elementary School in Calamba City, Pulo Elementary School, Pulo National High School, and Pulo Senior High School in Cabuyao.

Additionally, CLICC (Creative Learners and Innovative Content Creators), a student organization under CAS, collaborated with RFV Charities of CAS Professor Rogelio F. Valenzuela to raise funds to purchase supplies for the schools in Bay, Laguna, namely: Bay Central Elementary School and Santo Domingo Elementary School. The donated school materials were turned over on August 15, 2022.

The project has shown itself to be successful, and as the start of the academic year draws near, the representatives of each partner school are happy and appreciative of the support. Mapúa MCL aims to witness the Bayanihan enthusiasm every year and to keep offering these services to the partner schools.

#### A Tree Today for Tomorrow

Throughout the years, the Earth's climate has been continuously degenerating as a result of consistent deforestation. Given that nature should be Earth's first line of defense against calamities, however, due to the public's negligence, this has been causing adverse effects on the environment.

As a preemptive measure, **Mapúa Malayan Kalikasan** - a non-academic student organization of Mapúa Malayan Colleges Laguna, had their sights set on bringing forth a collective group of people to protect the environment - conducted a tree planting initiative titled "Affair with Nature 2022: A Tree Today for Tomorrow" in Barangay Tulos in Rosario, Batangas.

Members from different college departments, alongside Mapúa MCL -MapKAL's alumni, even aspiring ones, have engaged in this activity and proceeded to plant 80 trees comprised of Molave, Balayong or Palawan cherry blossoms, Ylang-ylang, Tabubuena, Atis, Guyabano, Star Apple, and Bignay, with the help of their partner organization, the Pacita Organic Garden.

As the members dig up the ground, the carbonized rice hull (CRH) - a burnt rice hull which is rich in phosphorous, potassium, calcium, magnesium, and micronutrients vital in growing crops - is then put, followed by an organic fertilizer such as chicken manure that makes the soil healthy for trees to grow. After all is done, the plant is placed carefully, then covered with soil.

After going through such rigorous activity, the members then went ahead on a three-hour hike towards the Jaybanga Rice Terraces - a rice field built by hand with an araro (plow). Crossing a river, a three-hour hike, and going through the forest, these members have proved their commitment to wanting to make a change for the betterment of the environment for the next generation.



As society gears toward the future, the Earth should be the public's haven in sheltering themselves, protecting them from any harm. Unfortunately, in this age and time where humans are one of the leading causes of adversities that people suffer, maintaining this haven proves to be a challenge.

This problem triggers an uproar in society, which serves as a wake-up call to those who want to preserve and protect nature. Organizations like Mapúa Malayan Kalikasan urges the youth to take the lead in paving the way for a safer and better environmental state where people can thrive without fear from natural disasters.

#### **A Survey to Assess** the Satisfaction with the Services of **Selected Barangay Health Centers**

Barangay is an important part of the community in the Philippines. The officials, workers, and volunteers work together to accommodate the needs and concerns of the residents. One of the services in a barangay community is a local health center that ensures the residents' well-being. To ensure their efficiency, it is important to know the residents' thoughts. Thus, Ms. Imelda Cariño and her students from the SS151 (Community Development) class conducted a survey on three (3) barangays from Cabuyao City, Laguna.

From May 18 to June 3, 2023, the students worked with Brgy. Mamatid, Brgy. San Isidro, and Brgy. Banlic and went around the neighborhood to complete the task. The assessment was participated in by at least 25 residents and health center workers. The students measured the level of satisfaction with the services they received from their barangay health centers by doing interviews and surveys. They analyzed the data collected and created a summary which they submitted to each barangay's health center.

This activity resulted in the residents voicing their opinions to the health center services and to the health workers being made aware of their value, that their works and efforts were appreciated. It was also an opportunity for them to reflect on the areas that need improvement to strengthen their community. The activity will go forward with its second phase in the next term coinciding with the UN's SDG 4 (Good Health and Well-being) and SDG 16 (Peace, Justice, and Strong Institutions).

## **Computer Programming Workshop** as a Means of Exposure to **Non-Programming Students**

## CGC's Psychosocial and Mental Health Awareness Seminar with DJIHS

In 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic pestered the world with a then untreatable and deadly virus that forced everyone to isolate themselves from the comfort of their homes. Everyone, in different parts of the world, was mentally and physically affected by the global health crisis. Here in the Philippines, one of the affected sectors was the young generation of students. Most of them may have experienced anxiety and shock due to effects of the pandemic. The students' mental health concerns matter, especially now that public schools have braced for the beginning of face-to-face classes again and everyone will once again be required to adapt to the *now normal*.

With this, Mapúa Malayan Colleges Laguna's (Mapúa MCL)
Center for Guidance and Counseling (CGC), in collaboration with
the Center for Service-Learning and Community Engagement
(CSCE), conducted its first in-person seminar on Mental Health
and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) with the Grade 7 and 8
students of Don Jose Integrated High School (DJIHS) on August
24, 2022. The seminar was aligned with the UN's Sustainable
Development Goal (SDG) 3 (Good Health and Well-Being).

During the seminar, **Ms. Joy P. Tarzona** of CGC discussed the mental and psychosocial effects of adjusting to the changes caused by the pandemic. As students are now slowly transcending into a new chapter of their lives, the need for supervision and guidance is even greater under the hands of experts in the field. Growing into a fine, self-knowing, and mature individual requires a lot of understanding. However, without the ability to discern what is right from wrong, one can never truly understand others if they cannot understand themselves from within.

Raising awareness on the core tenets of MHPSS, through the promotion of self-seeking behaviors and emotional well-being. In doing so, this program sought to build resiliency of students through greater self-awareness by understanding one's emotions and fostering one's welfare.

Ms. Tarzona then asked the students what mental health is – one of the participating students described it as the 'feeling that triggers anxiety and depression when not addressed and properly taken care of.' One reason mental health is not often talked about is due to the stigma attached to it. Hence, people tend to invalidate the relevance of the issue. Ms. Tarzona strongly encouraged the students and teachers to address mental health challenges and treat it as not something to be ashamed of.

The program proceeded to conduct a 'grounding' exercise, where some of the students eagerly participated in. One of the students were asked to identify things using the five senses: sight, sound, smell, taste, and touch. The reason being was further developing their sense of self-awareness by taking deep breaths and recognizing the senses in helping their focus and reflect on themselves. The program concluded with a Q&A session from the students and teachers from DJIHS.





The DJIHS community thanked Ms. Joy and CSCE for initiating such an important and timely issue. The program gave them the opportunity to undergo a physical seminar facilitated by a registered guidance counselor, like Ms. Joy, who values the importance of psychosocial and mental well-being.

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## **CGC Presented a Talk on Mental Health** to Schools in Calauan, Laguna

People, including children, are adapting to the "now normal," a transition from virtual learning to the return of face-to-face activities. It also serves as a reminder to check the well-being of each person, especially their mental health.

As part of their celebration of Mental Health Awareness Month. Mapúa Malayan Colleges Laguna (Mapúa MCL), through the collaboration of the Center for Guidance and Counseling (CGC) and the Center for Service-Learning and Community Engagement (CSCE), held its in-person Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) seminar on October 13, 2022, to its partner schools in Calauan, Laguna: Calauan Central Elementary School (CCES) and Makativille Elementary School (Makativille ES). Aligning with the UN's Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 3 (Good Health and Well-Being), the seminars were attended by more than 100 students from Grades 4, 5, and 6 of each school. Conducted by Ms. Joy P. Tarzona, MAEd, RGC, CGC Guidance Counselor, each seminar raised awareness on the core of mental health for young learners, build resiliency through self-awareness, boost emotions, and apply adaptive coping mechanisms to manage stressful situations effectively.



During the lecture, the students shared their thoughts about mental health and gave examples of situations that triggered their emotions or raised mental health issues, such as family problems or the feeling of anxiety. The students also took part in a series of relaxation activities and grounding exercises where they identified their surroundings using the body's five senses.





At the end of the seminar, Ms. Jocelyn T. Bellin, CSCE Director, gave a moment of gratitude to the teachers, administrators, and students of CCES and Makativille ES for the opportunity to share a very timely topic on MHPSS and recognize mental health as an indicator of the quality of one's well-being. In response, the CCES and Makativille ES communities expressed their gratitude to Mapúa MCL for conducting the seminar to their respective schools and gave a chance for their students to inform and learn about the topic.

Like adults, it was also important for children to learn about the importance of mental health. As the return to face-to-face classes went into full swing, the seminar hoped to help the students not to feel as anxious as the blended learning setup during the COVID-19 pandemic. The collaboration of CSCE and CGC on presenting MHPSS to partner schools showed that giving support to one's well-being should always start young.

### Mapúa MCL CSCE and CCIS and **Rotary Club BGC Central Visited Partner Schools** for its Digital Learning Initiative

With the changing landscape of education, the method of delivering lessons in the classroom has likewise evolved. This has brought about the use of devices like the digital smart board, a large monitor that serves as a virtual blackboard not only used to present lessons but also view media and interactive content that enhances the learning experience of students.

Mapúa Malayan Colleges Laguna (Mapúa MCL), through the **Center for Service-Learning and Community Engagement** (CSCE), and Rotary Club of Bonifacio Global City (BGC) Central, collaborated in the project to provide a Digital Learning Platform for the latter's host community from the Department of Education (DepEd) - Division of Taguig-Pateros namely: Bagong Tanyag Elementary School, Tipas National High School, and Palar Integrated School. The partnership is part of Rotary Club's corporate social responsibility (CSR) and advocacy in improving the quality of instruction in the Philippines. The Digital Learning Platform project aims to support and provide technical assistance and guidance on the specifications of the digital boards donated by Rotary Club BGC Central for the teachers of the partner schools. Mapúa MCL's College of Computer and Information Science (CCIS) and CSCE have collaborated to provide technical assistance through the development of a computer literacy training

program to be implemented in November 2023. The partnership between CSCE and Rotary Club BGC Central corresponds to the department's advocacy for lifelong learning.



The initial stages of the project began in 2019; however, the series of lockdowns caused by the COVID-19 pandemic the following years has stalled the project. Once limited face-to-face classes resumed in 2022, the teachers began using digital boards in their lectures, particularly the Mathematics, Science, and Araling Panlipunan (Social Studies) subjects. Students of the Alternative Learning System (ALS) also used the devices.

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#### **Digital Learning Initiative (cont.)**



CSCE, CCIS and Ms. Clarinda Quisao, President of Rotary BGC Central, visited the above-mentioned schools on July 12, 2023, to gather relevant feedback from the schools on their use of the digital boards. The whole-day visit enabled the Project Team to get personally acquainted with the school heads and teachers from each school who then shared their practices and ideas on the use of the digital boards. Their responses were mostly positive, stating that the donated equipment was a tremendous help to them and the students due to the equipment's high functionality. The combination and use of visuals and sounds for an interactive and immersive experience added to the overall functionality of the equipment.

On the other hand, the teachers were concerned about the issues with connectivity and equipment-related anomalies. To address these, CSCE and CCIS will plan to implement steps to provide technical assistance, literacy training, and instructional design programs to maximize the usage of the digital boards as well as utilize the existing and new technology for class presentations.

With the new academic year fast approaching, every school must adapt new strategies to keep up with the changing times. The collaboration between Mapúa MCL CSCE and Rotary Club BGC Central hopes to suffice the needs of the teachers and their students to contribute to the improvement of the quality of education in the Philippines.



#### PTC's Project RISE Signs MOA with Mapúa MCL

To eradicate the adverse effects of disasters, the **Philippine** Transmarine Carriers, Inc. (PTC), an organization that aims to harness the expertise of current and future maritime professionals by working together in sharing knowledge and skills with communities in terms of disaster preparedness, community disaster resilience, and risk management, has partnered with Mapúa Malayan Colleges Laguna (Mapúa MCL) to facilitate the implementation of Project RISE (Resiliency Improvement, Support, and Education). A Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) was forged on September 28, 2022 and witnessed by the Mapúa MCL and PTC officials and representatives.

The project consists of the following components: (1) Training programs - Citizens' Training Program and Master Training Program; (2) the Project RISE mobile app that will monitor the weather and calamities that would affect the City of Cabuyao; (3) Master of Disaster (MOD) - a board game that teaches how to





prepare and actively respond to different calamities in the Philippines; (4) PTC-RISE Mapúa MCL Volunteers - Mapúa MCL student volunteers through the Mapúa-PTC College of Maritime Education and Training (Mapúa-PTC CMET); and (5) Integration of Modules on Disaster Risk Reduction and Management (DRRM) into the National Service Training Program (NSTP) courses to mainstream topics about climate change adaptation and disaster risk reduction.

## 4,761 Days and Counting, Moving Forward: PTC-RISE Orients Student Leaders and Facilitators

In 2009, Typhoon *Ondoy* (International Name: *Ketsana*) left the Philippines in utter destruction as it caused unimaginable casualties. More than a decade has passed, but the remains of the terrifying incident stays.

In his speech during the **PTC-RISE Student Leaders and Facilitators Orientation** on October 7, 2022, Prof. James Ronald O. Mesina, Assistant Vice President for External Relations and Global Linkages, highlighted the importance of learning disaster risk reduction and management as all share the same space, same environment, and the same natural resources.

The **Philippine Transmarine Carriers, Inc. (PTC)** aims to and is currently training five (5) master communities under **Project RISE.**These communities are: (1) Balayan, Batangas; (2) Bacoor, Cavite; (3) Imus and General Trias, Cavite; (4) City of Cabuyao, Laguna; and (5) Iloilo City; with tha aim to enhance their disaster preparedness and resilience capacities and to contribute to the ongoing local and national efforts to capacitate each community for better DRRM.

PTC discussed the importance of Mapúa MCL's participation in pursuing a series of activities of sustained engagements about disaster preparedness and resiliency. The project objectives are as follows: (1) Master Trainer Program; (2) Citizen Training Program; (3) Project RISE mobile app; (4) Master of Disaster (MOD) board game; (5) Project RISE - Mapúa MCL Volunteers; (6) Integration of DRRM topics to NSTP courses; and (7) Project RISE Cabuyao Volunteer Network.



The Asia Society for Social Improvement and Sustainable Transformation (ASSIST), led the participants in playing the *Master of Disaster* - a fun-packed board game that teaches players how to prepare and respond to most common disasters such as fires, floods, and earthquakes. Mapúa MCL students, as well as the Mapúa-PTC CMET faculty, had an engaging experience in playing the board game.

As long as there are natural disasters happening, PTC assured that they will never stop capacitating communities in need, in hopes to establish a resilient community, and eventually, a resilient life.

## **Becoming Masters of Disaster**

Continuing what they've started, the **Philippine Transmarine Carriers, Inc. (PTC)** commits to its purpose of bringing up well-abled individuals in disaster preparedness and resiliency.

One of **Project RISE's** components is the *Master Trainer Program* (*MTP*), a training program, in partnership with the **Asia Society for Social Improvement and Sustainable Transformation** (**ASSIST**), that seeks to equip the students, facilitators, and administrators of **Mapúa Malayan Colleges Laguna** (**Mapúa MCL**) with the knowledge requored to be resilient. Once accomplished, the individuals who participated in the program are expected to be Master Trainers who will be in charge of disseminating information about disaster preparedness to their respective organizations and communities.

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#### Masters of Disaster (cont.)

In pursuance of this matter, PTC, along with ASSIST, conducted the very first Master Trainer Program on October 18, 2022. PTC, being a lead player in the maritime industry, continuously advocates building resilient communities. With that, PTC works with the local government of the City of Cabuyao in hopes of equippine its residents with the skills which can be mobilized in times of disaster.



Mr. Welfredo D. Dalumpines, the Program Manager for Environment and Disaster Resilience of Aboitiz Foundation, and Chairperson of the League of Corporate Foundations Committee on Disaster Resilience, gauged the participants' understanding of Disaster Risk Reduction and Management (DRRM).

With DRRM focused on reducing casualties during disasters, the emphasis must be on preventing what could happen rather than responding to what happened already. The Philippines, being one of the most disaster-prone countries, suffers natural calamities throughout the year, causing casualties, both accounted for and unaccounted for. PTC saw the opportunity for the need to prevent rather than respond to move forward and successfully adapt to the ever-changing situation of the environment.

During the program, Ms. Jocelyn T. Bellin, the Director of the Center for Service-Learning and Community Engagement (CSCE), led a discussion about Gender-Based Violence in Emergencies (GBViE) from a humanitarian perspective.



Gender, in times of disasters, must be taken into consideration as it plays a vital role in how one is being affected by a calamity. As previously mentioned, people are being accounted for, but many are unaccounted for as well. Persons with disabilities (PWD), pregnant women, and other people from the vulnerable sectors are differently affected as they are unprotected since they do not have the means to do so for themselves. Thus, knowing how to be act accordingly based on gender must be encouraged by DRRM to prevent unnecessary incidents that may occur.

The MTP included a total of 150 on-site participants and 61 people who attended through online platforms. Each organization received a Master of Disaster (MOD) board game as a token of appreceiation for showing interest and willingness to capacitate themselves with the proper knowledge to be used when in need.

The discussion continued further at the *Citizen Training Program (CTP)* held on December 7, 2022. The participants cascaded the lessons on DRRM and GBViE to their fellow students and members of their respective communities as part of their project commitments. Through these collective efforts of PTC, ASSIST, and Mapúa MCL, it is hoped that the students, facilitators, and school administrators continue to be Masters of Disaster.



## **Prevention Made Ready**

In line with Fire Prevention Month, Mapúa Malayan Colleges
Laguna (Mapúa MCL), through the Center for Service-Learning
and Community Engagement (CSCE), together with the
Philippine Transmarine Carriers, Inc. (PTC), have pursued
measures to instill knowledge necessary to a well-prepared
response and survival to combat emergencies. With this, the RISE
Program Basic First Aid and Burn Prevention Training was held on
March 24, 2023, in hopes to enrich the knowledge of fifty-five (55)
Mapúa MCL Master Trainers, four (4) of which were females, on
disaster risk reduction as well as their safety skills.

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#### Basic First Aid and Burn Prevention (cont.)



Ms. Jonamae Fabale, a certified first aid specialist and a volunteer from the Philippine Red Cross, served as the Resource Person. The first part of the training solely focused on discussing why the Philippines experience such drastic changes every year, and what importance does it hold agains human life. She also cleared out the common misconceptions about natural hazards, disasters, and risks.



Afterwards, Ms. Fabale highlighted the importance of giving first aid especially since medical services dispatch will not always be available once emergency strikes. Thus, first aid treatment must be given to the patient prior to the arrival of a medical team. Proper treatment of unconscious patients by checking the airway, breathing and circulation was highlighted. Moreover, legal concerns regarding first aid like implied consent – if the patient is unconscious; and judgment consent – if the patient is unstable due to intoxication, being irrational, or being a minor – were also reviewed to avoid reckless mistakes such as leaving the patient behind as one could result in a legal action, were also emphasized. Additionally, triaging/triage – tagging or labeling the patients in the site of disaster for a prompt response depending on their priority level was taught as well.

















Cadets from the Mapúa-PTC College of Maritime Education and Training (Mapúa-PTC CMET) have engaged in an interactive session of first aid application and demonstration. Ms. Fabale initiated a series of demonstrations on ways to do medical bandaging for the head, eyes, shoulder, chest, back, arms, and feet injuries. She also showed how to treat burns by using only a triangular bandage – a strip of cloth used for bandaging – forming it into a (1) broad cravat; (2) semi-broad cravat; and (3) narrow cravat. Another demonstration focused on how to transport patients by doing the cradle's carry, firefighter's carry, pack-strap carry, among others that was soon attempted by the cadets themselves.



After going through a rigorous session, the Mapúa-PTC CMET cadets left the training as well-equipped individuals, both in terms of being a Master Trainer as well as being knowledgeable in first aid.

Through this training, CSCE and PTC can only hope that this could mark the beginning of Filipinos, starting with the Mapúa MCL community, in being well-prepared to put a stop to the vicious cycle of home displacement and loss of lives due to the glorification of "resiliency" as it does not alleviate the harsh realities the victims face daily.



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
